From the Desk of the Sheriff...



Dear Yamhill County Citizen,

It has been my great honor to serve as your Sheriff over the past year. Each day presents new learning opportunities, and the more I learn, the more I appreciate the dedication and hard work of the staff and volunteers at the Yamhill County Sheriff's Office. This annual report highlights the remarkable work accomplished by our organization and reflects the support we receive here in Yamhill County. The year 2024 was filled with both opportunities and challenges, and I look forward to continuing many initiatives that began this past year.

This year has been particularly challenging as we have navigated significant staffing shortages, which have placed an exceptional burden on our team members to maintain our commitment to providing public safety services 24 hours a day, 7 days a week, 365 days a year. We have worked diligently to fill vacancies, reaching full staffing of all budgeted positions in the Corrections Division by late fall 2024, and we hired a total of 11 staff members across all divisions throughout the year.

To reduce the strain on our personnel, I prioritized employee wellness and appreciation. Thanks to generous donations and with the incredible support from peers, vendors, and community members, we were able to provide a meal for every staff member during National Corrections Officers Week and National Police Week. Additionally, we organized a family barbecue for all employees at Amity City Park during the summer.

In collaboration with Public Safety Chaplaincy, we established resources to help team members manage the stresses associated with law enforcement work. This initiative will continue into 2025, with some exciting opportunities on the horizon..

We could not succeed in our mission without the invaluable support of our numerous volunteers. In 2024, our volunteer programs collectively contributed 23,037 hours of service, which equates to \$800,305.38 in donated time. For context, in 2013, volunteer programs provided a total of 12,799 hours, valued at \$273,396. This remarkable statistic highlights the tremendous contributions of our volunteers, and I cannot adequately express my gratitude for their efforts and the support they provide to this office. To honor their service, we held our first Volunteer Appreciation Banquet in 2024, which we plan to make an annual event.

I strive to be transparent and share available information on various topics. This report serves as one way to accomplish that, and I hope you take the time to read it and ask any questions you may have. I am also pleased to continue our work in updating and publishing our agency policy manual. We have made significant strides in this effort, with plans to publish all policies on our website for public access.

As the residents of Yamhill County, you are my supervisors, and I am committed to keeping you informed about our work. I will seize every opportunity to highlight the outstanding efforts of the men and women of the Yamhill County Sheriff's Office.




Overall budget reduction from FY 22 to FY 24 is 9%



2024-2025 Budget Breakdown




Organizational Chart







Top 30 Calls for Service




ENFORCEMENT Calls for Service by Area

2024 Percent by Area









Total Meals Served with Average Cost Per Meal






