

Dear ODOC Director Reese,

This letter is included within the introductory pages of the 2025-2027 Biennial Plan submitted by Yamhill County Department of Community Justice (YCDCJ). Yamhill County is approaching 50 years of a collaborative partnership with the State of Oregon in the administration of local community corrections since 1977. It should be noted that Yamhill County was the second county in Oregon to choose full participation in a then newly emerging design of county operated correctional programs.

The YCDCJ 2025-27 DOC Biennial Plan was presented to and approved by our Local Public Safety Coordinating Council on 9/24/25 for submission to ODOC with the final approval of the Yamhill County Board of Commissioners on 9/25/25.

Despite this biennium's community corrections budget shortfall, following a positive outlook after the release of the Governor's Recommended Budget and the February state revenue forecast, YCDCJ continues to strive to maintain and implement the most evidence-based correctional practices as is mandated by law and associated with best supervision outcomes. YCDCJ staff receive regular trainings regarding the most innovative and best practices. In partnership with local criminal justice stakeholders, Yamhill County is focusing on integrating evidence-based decision making throughout our local criminal justice system to reduce recidivism rates and the use of state prison beds. As a team, our main areas of focus continue to be prison sentencing reform, innovative programming resulting in positive outcome measures, and sanctioning alternatives to incarceration.

I believe our long history of local collaboration within the Yamhill County's criminal justice system continues to promote local partnerships and system enhancements. When we work together, we find the most efficiency and success for community supervision, services, and sanctions. We offer our thanks for accepting and reviewing the Yamhill County DOC Biennial Plan for the 2025-2027 biennium.

Program Name:	Motivational/Cognitive Programming
Program Description:	<p>Prior facilitation of our YCDCJ cognitive behavioral programs was provided by a Health and Human Services staff member at the Day Management Center (DMC). However, with the retirement of that previous HHS staff member in May of 2025, as well as the loss of the use of the DMC building due to structural risk liability and safety concerns, the new Corrections Program Specialist has now been filled with an internal YCDCJ position operating within our main community corrections building where all our PPO offices are housed. With this change comes the goal of creating more relevant and robust programming in closer proximity to the PPOs providing the AOS referrals. Motivational, trauma informed, gender-responsive, and cognitive behavioral-based programming include motivational groups as well as University of Cincinnati curricula such as Thinking 4 a Change and Moving On that serves medium and high-risk individuals with criminal thinking patterns.</p> <p>Assists Adults on Supervision (AOS) to become motivated to enrolled in mandated alcohol and drug treatment programs and self-help groups.</p> <p>Assists AOS transitioning from prison and/or local control jail sentences to become motivated to live a pro-social lifestyle.</p> <p>Addresses AOS antisocial attitudes and thinking patterns as well as antisocial peer associations/relationships.</p> <p>The Corrections Program Specialist also focuses services on medium and high-risk AOS to assist with skill building around obtaining employment and furthering education, adding an extra layer of accountability to supervision provided by YCDCJ. In collaboration with the Corrections Program Specialist, PPO's can make referrals to request assistance with utilizing job search tools, interview preparation and resume building. The University of Cincinnati Employment Readiness curriculum (locally termed Sustained Employment Always-SEA class) is used for group facilitation of employment skills.</p>
Program Category:	Behavioral Health Tx Services – CBT
Program Objectives:	<p>Utilizes motivational, trauma informed and cognitive behavioral-based programming (such as motivation groups, Moving On, and Thinking 4 a Change) to impact individuals with criminal thinking patterns.</p> <p>Assists AOS to become motivated to enroll in mandated alcohol and drug treatment programs and self-help groups.</p> <p>Assists AOS transitioning from prison and/or local control jail sentences to become motivated to engage in a pro-social lifestyle. Provides an additional layer of accountability and program services.</p> <p>Addresses AOS antisocial attitude and thinking patterns as well as antisocial peer associations/relationships.</p> <p>Provides a continuum of motivational cognitive programming services for referral or as an intervention/sanction to address AOS' condition violation.</p> <p>Assists with skill building around obtaining employment and furthering education.</p> <p>Assists with job search tools, interview preparation and resume building.</p> <p>Concentrated employment assistance will be afforded to AOS through job search strategies training, active employment development, and one-on-one job search guidance/coaching.</p> <p>Makes available a matrix of services including employment skills, job referral assistance and support, incentives/rewards, mentorship and community support.</p> <p>AOS in receipt of subsidy housing services also work closely with our Sustained Employment Always (SEA class) CBT program to assist with employment assistance for AOS through job search strategies training, active employment development, and one-on-one job search guidance/coaching, providing a matrix of services including employment skills, job referral assistance and support, incentives/rewards, mentorship, and community support.</p>

Method(s) of Evaluation:	<p>Core objectives of this program include active participation by AOS in life skills endeavors and enhancement of the employment process. It is also an expectation that there will be a reduction in supervision violations and criminal activity among those successfully participating in the program. Ultimately, evaluation is measured by referred AOS who gain and maintain long-term, sustainable employment. Such data can be tracked through PPO employment entries and updates in AS400.</p> <p>The measurement of overall cognitive behavioral program effectiveness begins with the entry of the referral and program entry in the treatment module of CIS, permitting the department to determine treatment completion rates and program recidivism rates. Demographic and other data is also collected and analyzed on a regular basis to determine overall program success. A CPC was conducted by DOC in December 2021 which yielded a score of 65% - Highly Effective. CBT continues to be subject to the Corrections Program Checklist (CPC) and/or RNR Program Tool (George Mason University) as completed by the Department of Corrections.</p>



Program Description:	<p>This category includes intra-county agreements to fund services to Yamhill County Adults on Supervision (AOS) such as mental health programs, mental health evaluations and Development Disability Services. Programs and services are provided through Yamhill County Health and Human Services Behavioral Health Division and Yamhill County Coordinated Care.</p> <p>Some services are contracted for psychiatric or psychological evaluation with private providers in the community as needed on rare occasions.</p> <p>Mental health services are provided in partial support to a limited number of AOS ordered to be involved in domestic violence treatment who also have special needs.</p> <p>Yamhill County Mental Health as well as private physicians and psychologists have advanced professional degrees and provide professional treatment services. Yamhill County is a part of the Yamhill County Care Organization (CCO). These programs have rigid standards for treatment planning and care.</p>
Program Category:	Behavioral Health Tx Services – Mental Health
Program Objectives:	<p>Yamhill County Health and Human Services Behavioral Health Department provide services to YCDCJ in support of individuals under supervision who have identified mental health disorders. The objective is to provide appropriate medical and mental health services to individuals needing this service.</p> <p>Private physicians and psychologists provide evaluation when court ordered as a part of a presentence investigation or ordered as a condition of community supervision.</p> <p>Program methodology and treatment approaches are consistent with Evidence Based Practices, defined to suggest content and curriculum are designed to match criminogenic factors identified in referral and evaluation of the AOS. MH programming is subject to the Corrections Program Checklist (CPC) and/or RNR Program Tool (George Mason University) as completed by the Department of Corrections.</p>
Method(s) of Evaluation:	The measurement of overall program effectiveness begins at the entry of the program in the treatment module of CIS/AS400, permitting YCDCJ to determine treatment completion rates and program recidivism rates. In determining if the treatment program is evidence-based, per statutory requirements, MH programming is subject to the Corrections Program Checklist (CPC) and/or RNR Program Tool (George Mason University) completed by the Department of Corrections.

Additional funding for psychological testing and evaluation as needed is an element in this program. Related expenses for other testing, evaluation, or services related to sex offender registration and notification leveling are incorporated into this section.</p> <p>Evidence Based Practices: Therapists providing treatment services to this population have at a minimum a master's degree. Program content, curriculum, and treatment methodology closely follows conventional treatment practices used throughout the country. These practices are directly linked to the goal of reduction in re-offense.</p>

Program Objectives:	<p>Provides individuals convicted of a sexual crime with an understanding of their cycle of abuse, interventions to interrupt patterns of behavior leading to new crime, and lifestyle patterns to minimize exposure to potential victims.</p> <p>Prevents or intervenes in life circumstances that may occur that could bring harm to others and thereby protect the community from offensive conduct and new victimization.</p> <p>Utilizes evidence-based practices in delivering supervision and treatment services.</p> <p>Provides ongoing status reports to the PPO regarding AOS performance in treatment.</p>
Method(s) of Evaluation:	The measurement of overall treatment effectiveness begins with the entry of the program into the Corrections Information System (CIS), permitting the department to determine how many clients were referred, the individual program completion rates, and overall recidivism rates. In determining if the treatment programs are evidence-based, the Corrections Program Checklist (CPC) is utilized. The last CPC with Effective Foundations was conducted in May 2023 which resulted in a score 58%-above satisfactory. Sex Offender Treatment is subject to the Corrections Program Checklist (CPC) and/or RNR Program Tool (George Mason University) as completed by the Department of Corrections.

All high and medium risk AOS will have an individualized, targeted case plan developed in partnership with the assigned PPO. Supervision strategies will adhere to the basic principles of Evidence-Based Practices. Caseloads are organized by crime types and include units such as domestic violence, sex offense, behavioral health, low risk Casebank, geographical general, gender female responsive, Adult Recovery Court (ARC) and Court Coordinated Services (CCS) behavioral health court.</p>
Program Category:	Supervision
Program Objectives:	<p>Achieve satisfaction of court ordered, Parole Board and/or Supervisory Authority imposed conditions to promote a positive transition from incarceration back into the community or assist to prevent probationers from prison incarceration. Promote law-abiding adjustment from incarceration to self-support. The department provides supervision by verifying an appropriate residence, developing an employment/educational plan and supporting AOS in pro-social activities and programs. Our internal "Red Line Exception" agreement process and partnership between YCDCJ and the District Attorney's Office prioritizes the supervision of certain higher-level cases that are funded by county general funds.</p>

Program Name:	SMART Sentencing Prison Diversion Program
Program Description:	<p>Yamhill County implemented the SMART Sentencing Initiative Program in November of 2013. This program was designed to decrease state prison growth by assessing specific, non-violent, presumptive prison bound defendants to determine appropriateness for prison deferral or a reduction in prison months imposed. The Defendant Assessment Report (DAR) targets presumptive prison, non-person, felony offenses on a pre-sentence level. The DAR is a 3–6-page report prepared by Community Justice which outlines a defendant’s risk for recidivism based on the LSCMI (Level of Services Case Management Inventory), WRNA (Women’s Risk/Needs Assessment) and the ASUS (Adult Substance Use Survey). In addition to providing risk, motivation, mental health and substance abuse information, DCJ makes a recommendation whether the defendant could be safely managed in the community. It also outlines recommended special conditions of supervision which are based on the risk areas identified in the DAR.</p> <p>Currently, there are two DCJ Probation Officers responsible for completion of all DAR cases as well as providing the specialized supervision to those individuals who receive a downward prison departure because of the DAR court recommendation and final court resolution. Program Objectives:	Provides evidence-based risk, motivation, substance abuse, and mental health information on a pre-sentence basis with the goal of reducing state prison growth through safe prison diversion. The program includes recommendations of special conditions of community supervision that are directly connected to an individual’s identified criminogenic risk areas to reduce the likelihood of recidivism. Provides enhanced, dosage based, community supervision for those who receive downward dispositional departures as a result of the DAR.
Method(s) of Evaluation:	<p>The SMART Sentencing Program tracks the number of people that enter DOC custody, the number of participants involved in the downward departure program, success/recidivism rates of participants, and the treatment and other services offered to each AOS. It also continues to track probation revocations for technical violations, treatment court failures, absconding and/or the conviction of new crimes.</p> <p>The program also tracks a host of demographic data to aid in ongoing decision making, such as race/ethnicity, gender, employment status, age and education levels. Judicial concurrence rates estimated prison months deferred and imposed. Evaluator recommendations and final sentences on case resolutions are also tracked.</p> <p>Our data indicates that an estimated 5394 prison months have been deferred from November 2013 through June 2025. As a result of our efforts, 280 defendants have been deferred from prison and 133 of those individuals have successfully completed supervision. Just 81 AOS have been revoked, and only 18 were connected to a new criminal conviction.</p> <p>Project data is routinely shared through Criminal Justice Commission Justice (CJC) Reinvestment Program (JRP) Grant reports and our Local Public Safety Coordinating Counsel.</p>

Program Name:	Yamhill County Adult Recovery Court (ARC)
Program Description:	<p>The Adult Recovery Court (ARC) has a dedicated staff of professional providers to assist participants in the successful accomplishment of drug court program requirements. Participants can receive both mental health and substance use disorder services, if needed, and have access to medication assisted treatment (MAT). All participants choosing the program will work with the team to develop plans that are specific and unique to their individual needs. The treatment courts work to assist clients prioritize and address individual case issues in a timely, realistic, and effective manner. It is a highly specialized program lasting 12 to 18 months and serves (treats) long time justice involved individuals. Participants are referred through the legal system. ARC is a tool for criminal court partners and the judiciary to facilitate coordinated approaches that address the needs of nonviolent individuals involved in the justice system who have substance use disorders and/or co-occurring mental health needs. ARC effectively integrates evidence-based substance use disorder treatment, random drug testing, equitable sanctions and incentives, and recovery support services in a judicially supervised court setting to reduce recidivism and substance use and misuse, as well as prevent overdoses.</p> <p>Of note, many participants of the SMART Sentencing program (see related program narrative), are also participants in ARC. The cross-over enables participants who have been diverted from a Department of Corrections prison sentence to receive the most resources available to achieve success in the community.</p> <p>Currently, YCDCJ supports ARC by dedicating two Probation Officers toward working with mutual ARC clients. These Officers attend regular ARC team meetings, trainings, and case staffings as well as aid in collection of outcome data.</p>
Program Category:	Other Programs and Services
Program Objectives:	ARC offers an alternative to incarceration for non-violent individuals with substance use disorders, providing them an opportunity for treatment and recovery. Objectives include reducing recidivism, reducing substance abuse, and rehabilitation of program participants. This is accomplished by providing intensive treatment and supervision as well as frequent drug testing and wrap-around supports.
Method(s) of Evaluation:	<p>Oregon Judicial Department (OJD) is in the process of a one/three/five-year study on recidivism rates in ARC participants. What this means is that OJD is looking at justice involved individuals who graduated from drug courts and tracking to see if that person re-entered the justice system one year, three, and five years post-graduation. Also, if the person re-entered the system with charges that were lesser than previous convictions. This study will be complete and made available in the 25-27 biennium and will aid in evaluating the program on multiple levels. In addition, OJD maintains a data dashboard tracking a host of data elements for all ARC participants. Examples include employment status, education levels, housing, program graduation and termination rates, substance free births, race/ethnicity, gender, and risk/need levels.</p> <p>On average for the 23-25 biennium, ARC has achieved a 59% graduation rate. 27 people graduated, 17 terminated and 2 discharged (one released to an out-of-county residence so didn't qualify, one violated probation before being made official and probation was revoked).</p>

Program Name:	Yamhill County Court Coordinated Services (CCS)
Program Description:	<p>CCS serves individuals with chronic mental illness or a developmental disability. It is a mental health court with a treatment-focused program of court supervision for adults facing criminal charges in Yamhill County. The goal is to help the individual achieve lasting stability so that they are less likely to re-offend. In CCS the participant will follow a treatment plan that may include medication monitoring, substance abuse monitoring, individual and group therapy, skill training, case management and community integration. Eligibility for the program is determined by the CCS Team. The person must have a diagnosis of Schizophrenia, Bipolar I or II, a chronic paranoid disorder, a chronic psychotic disorder not caused by substance abuse, or a developmental disability. Other diagnoses may be considered on a case-by-case basis. There must be a strong link between the person's illness/disability and their current criminal charges. Criminal history and dangerousness will also be taken into consideration. Applicants must be Yamhill County residents and able and willing to engage in services.</p> <p>Currently, YCDCJ supports CCS by dedicating one Probation Officer toward working with mutual CCS clients. This Officer attends regular CCS team meetings, trainings, and case staffings as well as aids in collection of outcome data.</p>
Program Category:	Other Programs and Services
Program Objectives:	CCS aims to reduce recidivism, improve participants' quality of life, and enhance public safety by connecting individuals with mental health conditions to treatment and support services. This is achieved by diverting individuals from the traditional criminal justice system into specialized programs that address their specific needs. Other objectives include reducing justice system involvement, promoting collaboration, increasing access to treatment services, and reducing costs to justice systems and taxpayers.
Method(s) of Evaluation:	There currently is no method for evaluation of this program, however, the Oregon Judicial Department maintains a data dashboard tracking a host of data elements for all CCS participants. Examples include employment status, education levels, housing, program graduation and termination rates, substance free births, race/ethnicity, gender, and risk/need levels.
