Dear Yamhill County Voter,

This is your Yamhill County Voters' Pamphlet for the November 8, 2022, General Election. Please read through your pamphlet as it will provide you with information regarding candidates and measures printed on your ballot. Your pamphlet also includes candidate statements and arguments for or against certain measures submitted by those who chose to pay the required fee for this information to appear in your pamphlet.

Here are a few things you should know:

- Candidate names on your ballot will appear in random alphabetical order. In accordance with ORS 254.155, random ordering of the letters is conducted by the Secretary of State's office prior to an election.
- This Voters' Pamphlet includes all measures and races in Yamhill County for this election. Your official ballot will only include those candidates and measures that you are eligible to vote on, based on where you live.
- Not all candidates submit information for the Voters' Pamphlet, so you may have candidates on your ballot that are not in the Voters' Pamphlet.
- The signature on each voter's ballot return envelope is verified against the voter's signature on file. The signatures must match before a ballot can be counted. If your signature has changed, please update your voter registration.
- Ballots deposited in an Official Ballot Drop Box get to us faster and are postage free. We have sixteen Official Ballot Drop Sites in the county with one located in each city. Look for the list of sites in this pamphlet or on the county's website. You may deposit your ballot at any drop site 24 hours per day.
- Beginning January 1, 2022, postmarks can count! Your ballot return envelope must be **signed**, postmarked **on or before** Election Day, and received by the County Clerk's office **within seven days** after Election Day.
- If a ballot was delivered to your residence for someone who should no longer be receiving a ballot at your address, please write "RETURN" on the envelope and place it back in your mailbox or drop it in one of our Official Ballot Drop Boxes.
- Voter assistance is available for voters needing assistance in voting because of any disability. Please contact us at your earliest convenience to request this service.

New! Voter Pamphlet Translation

In 2021, the Oregon Legislature passed the Voter Language Access Bill (HB 3021) requiring the Secretary of State to translate portions of state and county voters' pamphlets in Oregon's most spoken languages. The law seeks to remove barriers to voting for those who are not fully proficient in English. The bill's requirements are being implemented for the first time this election.

To help in this effort, the Translation Advisory Council was created. The Council is made up of volunteer community members who represent the ethnic, linguistic, and cultural diversity of Oregon voters. Council members make sure translations are accurate and retain the original tone and meaning in a culturally appropriate manner.

Selected portions of this county voters' pamphlet are available in Simplified Chinese, German, Korean, Russian, Spanish and Vietnamese. These translations can be found online at sos.oregon.gov/elections/Pages/vp-yamhill.aspx

**Explanatory Statement
Measure 36-221**

Prohibits psilocybin-related businesses within Amity for 2-years.

Question: Shall Amity prohibit psilocybin-related businesses and manufacturing within City Limits for a period of 2-years?

Summary: State law allows the operation, manufacture, distribution, and possession of psilocybin and psilocin. State law provides that a city council may adopt an ordinance to be referred to the voters to prohibit the establishment of any of those registered or licensed activities.

Approval of this measure would prohibit the establishment of psilocybin manufacturers and/or psilocybin service center operators within Amity City Limits for a period of 2-years.

Approval of this measure would enact a two-year moratorium on the establishment and operation of psilocybin related businesses within the City of Amity.

A city council may adopt an ordinance that restricts the establishment and operation of psilocybin related businesses within city limits for up to two years. Yet, the council must refer such ordinance to the voters at a general election. The Amity City Council has adopted this moratorium ordinance and, as a result, is now referring the matter to the voters of the City of Amity.

If approved, this measure would enact the ordinance and prevent the establishment and operation of psilocybin related businesses until December 31, 2024. Specifically, this moratorium restricts businesses that manufacture and/or service psilocybin. This allows the City of Amity time to prepare for such businesses by adopting ordinances and codes to best integrate psilocybin businesses into the city.

Approval of the moratorium does not prohibit an individual's right to use psilocybin under Oregon law.

If the measure is not approved, such businesses may be established and initiate operations within the City of Amity as of January 2023.

Referred by City of Carlton Measure 36-213

Amends Carlton's Charter to update, reformat, and clarify provisions.

Question: Shall the Carlton Charter be amended to improve readability, clarity, and update outdated provisions?

Summary: This measure amends the Carlton Charter and replaces much of the current Charter language with language from the League of Oregon Cities Model Charter with additional editing by the City Council. The Mayor-Council form and the elected office functions of Carlton's government will not be changed by this Charter Amendment, and both Mayor and Councilors will continue to be elected positions.

The Model Charter language is more consistent with Oregon law and contains concise, flexible and simplified language on City authority, vesting of power, exercise of power, and authority of City officers. The substance of the Charter is kept substantially the same, with a small handful of substantial changes from the current Carlton Charter which include, clarifying Carlton's home rule status; defining the City's legislative, administrative and judicial authority; delegating employee administration tasks to the City Manager; defining the City Attorney position; linking employee compensation discussion to budget discussions; requiring Council consent to mayoral appointments; and removing language from the current Charter regarding Torts that is already covered by Oregon law.

Explanatory Statement Measure 36-213

If approved, this measure would enact a new home rule charter for the City of Carlton. The new charter would replace the current charter that was adopted by Carlton voters in 2006. The proposed charter is based on the League of Oregon Cities ("LOC") Model Charter and work of the City Council and City staff editing the LOC Model Charter. The City Council approved the new charter for submission to City voters.

The Oregon Constitution gives city voters the right to adopt home rule charters. A charter grants legal authority to a city government and defines the roles and responsibilities of city officials.

The proposed Charter continues to include current Carlton charter policies and practices including existing charter provisions unique and important to Carlton. The new charter more clearly defines the legal authority of the City Council, Mayor, and City Manager.

The City Council believes the new charter will better meet the current and future needs of the City. The proposed charter is easier to read and use than the current charter and is consistent with state law.

Prohibits psilocybin-related businesses within Carlton. Prohibition sunsets after two years.

Question: Shall the City of Carlton prohibit psilocybin-related businesses for two years?

Summary: State law allows for the manufacturing, transportation, delivery, sale and purchase of psilocybin, the psychedelic drug found in certain mushrooms. State law provides that a local government may adopt an ordinance to be referred to the voters to prohibit the establishment of licensed psilocybin product manufacturers and/or psilocybin service centers. The Carlton City Council adopted an ordinance to refer to the voters that temporarily prohibits psilocybin related businesses in Carlton to enable the city to consider local regulations once the state's psilocybin regulatory program is established.

Approval of the measure would prohibit the establishment of psilocybin product manufacturers and psilocybin service centers within the Carlton city limits until December 31, 2024. I have determined the proposed measure to be in compliance with the requirements of Section 1(2)(d), of Article IV of the Oregon Constitution.

Measure 36-220**

Approval of this measure would temporarily prohibit the establishment and operation of psilocybin-related businesses within the City of Carlton. A city council may adopt an ordinance prohibiting the establishment of psilocybin related businesses within the city, but the council must refer the ordinance to the voters at a statewide general election. The Carlton City Council has adopted an ordinance prohibiting the establishment of psilocybin related businesses within the City of Carlton for a period of two years and, as a result, has referred this measure to the voters.

If approved, this measure would prohibit psilocybin-related businesses within the City of Carlton until approximately December 31, 2024.



Question: Shall Dundee prohibit psilocybin-related businesses for two years?

Summary: State law allows for the manufacturing, transportation, delivery, sale and purchase of psilocybin, the psychedelic drug found in certain mushrooms. State law provides that a local government may adopt an ordinance to be referred to the voters to prohibit the establishment of licensed psilocybin product manufacturers and/or psilocybin service centers. The Dundee City Council adopted an ordinance to refer to the voters that temporarily prohibits psilocybin-related businesses within the city's jurisdiction to enable the city to consider local regulations once the Oregon Health Authority establishes the state's psilocybin regulatory program. Approval of the measure would prohibit the establishment of psilocybin product manufacturers and psilocybin service centers within the Dundee city limits until December 31, 2024.

**Explanatory Statement
Measure 36-219**

Approval of this measure would establish a two-year prohibition on psilocybin product manufacturers and psilocybin service centers within the city of Dundee. Psilocybin is the psychedelic drug derived from certain mushrooms. Oregon voters legalized psilocybin through Ballot Measure 109 (2020), which directs the Oregon Health Authority (OHA) to develop a psilocybin licensing and regulatory program for the state by January 2, 2023. OHA's psilocybin regulatory program is in development, and the city would like to consider local regulations for psilocybin-related businesses once OHA's program is established.

Ballot Measure 109 (2020) also allows a local government to adopt an ordinance to be referred to the voters prohibiting the establishment of certain licensed psilocybin-related businesses. The Dundee City Council has adopted such an ordinance for referral to the voters that temporarily prohibits psilocybin-related businesses to enable the city to consider local regulations once the state psilocybin program is established. If approved, this measure would prohibit psilocybin product manufacturers and psilocybin service centers within the city of Dundee until December 31, 2024.



Question: Should Lafayette be allowed to spend \$500,000 and \$2.5 million in grants to construct a 1,000,000 gallon reservoir?

Summary: Lafayette's Charter limits the City's ability to disburse or obligate for expenditure funds in excess of \$1 million on a capital improvement unless first approved by voters. A yes vote authorizes the City to expend an estimated \$3 million on a reservoir project to increase water storage to meet current and future fire flow and emergency storage. Approval of this measure will allow the City to use a \$2,250,000 State of Oregon grant, a \$125,000 Yamhill County grant, and \$625,000 of Lafayette funds for a total estimated cost of \$3 million. City funding is comprised of \$125,000 from ARPA funds and \$500,000 from the Water SDC Fund. A no vote eliminates the project for 2023 and risks grant funding. The proposed reservoir, included in the Water System Capital Improvement Plan, will triple water storage capacity from 500,000 to 1,500,000 total gallons. Approval of this ballot measure does not increase property taxes nor increase water rates.

Explanatory Statement Measure 36-218

CITY OF LAFAYETTE MEASURE: ALLOW CITY TO EXPEND FUNDS TO CONSTRUCT A WATER RESERVOIR
NOVEMBER 8, 2022 GENERAL ELECTION

The City of Lafayette's Charter limits the City's ability to disburse or obligate for expenditure funds in excess of \$1 million on a capital improvement unless first approved by voters. Lafayette provides water and sewer service to residents inside the city limits. The system is currently served by a single, 500,000-gallon reservoir which does not meet engineering standards for the City's general water storage, operational needs, or for emergency fire flow. A single reservoir complicates maintenance and increases the cost and difficulty of routine maintenance when the sole reservoir must be taken off-line. The addition of a 1 million-gallon reservoir would address current and future fire flow and emergency storage needs.

A yes vote authorizes the City to utilize funding from state, county, and city sources to construct a second reservoir to increase water storage capacity. A no vote eliminates the project for 2023 and could affect grant funding.

What would the project include?

The project would construct a 1,000,000-gallon reservoir at the City's watershed and connect it to the existing water system. Fencing, paving, electronic controls, and other required elements would be included.

How much will it cost?

The project is estimated to cost \$3,000,000 and would be constructed in 2023.

How will it be paid for?

The Oregon Legislature has dedicated a \$2,250,000 grant for the construction costs; Yamhill County has provided a grant of \$125,000; and the City will provide a \$125,000 grant from American Rescue Plan Act funds and \$500,000 from Water System Development Charges (SDC). The State and County grants are being allocated as part of the American Rescue Plan Act funding from the federal government.

What is the Financial Impact?

Approximately \$3 million in project funds, including \$2.5 million in grant funds, will be expended to construct a second reservoir. Funds allocated by the State and Yamhill County will be expended for eligible activities and city SDC funds will be spent on an eligible capital improvement project. City utility rates and property taxes will not be directly impacted.

Summary:

The construction of a new reservoir would triple the City's current storage to meet current and future water demands, increase fire flow, and provide redundant storage that will allow the City to take a reservoir off-line for routine maintenance without incurring additional costs as in the past. A second reservoir also provides greater resilience in the event of emergencies, including structural or wildland fires. A no vote eliminates the project for 2023 and could affect grant funding.

Prohibits psilocybin-related businesses within McMinnville.
Prohibition sunsets after two years.

Question: Shall the City of McMinnville prohibit psilocybin-related businesses for two years?

Summary: State law allows for the manufacturing, transportation, delivery, sale and purchase of psilocybin, the psychedelic drug found in certain mushrooms in compliance with state law. State law provides that a local government may adopt an ordinance to be referred to the voters to prohibit the establishment of licensed psilocybin product manufacturers and/or psilocybin service centers. The McMinnville City Council adopted an ordinance to refer to the voters that temporarily prohibits psilocybin related businesses in McMinnville to enable the city to consider local regulations once the state's psilocybin regulatory program is established.

Approval of the measure would prohibit the establishment of psilocybin product manufacturers and psilocybin service centers within the McMinnville city limits until December 31, 2024.

Measure 36-215**

Approval of this measure would temporarily prohibit the establishment and operation of psilocybin-related businesses within the City of McMinnville. A city council may adopt an ordinance prohibiting the establishment of psilocybin related businesses within the city, but the council must refer the ordinance to the voters at a statewide general election. The McMinnville City Council has adopted an ordinance prohibiting the establishment of psilocybin related businesses within the City of McMinnville for a period of two years and, as a result, has referred this measure to the voters.

If approved, this measure would prohibit psilocybin-related businesses within the City of McMinnville until December 31, 2024.

Sheridan School District serves students in southern Yamhill and northern Polk Counties. Currently the District is comprised of two schools, Faulconer-Chapman School (FCS) and Sheridan High School (SHS), with approximately 650 students and growing.

Long Range Facility Plan and Re-Visioning Sheridan High School

Beginning in the 2018-19 school year a group of community members, an architectural firm, and school representatives assessed the current facilities and created a Long Range Facility Plan (Plan) for the future. The School Board approved the Plan in January 2020.

Another committee, planning for the November 2022 Bond, reviewed the Plan and participated in a re-visioning process for SHS. Their focus was on creating safe and welcoming schools, improved music, choir and science teaching spaces, along with increasing the use of two gymnasiums. Based on their work, the following capital projects would be funded by the Bond measure, if approved:

- Create more secure school entrances at SHS and FCS
- Increase safety and security with interior and exterior upgrades to FCS and SHS
- Remodel the science classroom at SHS
- Remodel the music and choir rooms at FCS
- Remodel the SHS main office; add additional restrooms
- Renovate SHS and FCS old gymnasiums and FCS locker rooms
- Remodel the SHS locker rooms to team rooms
- Improve and expand parking at SHS
- Expand and improve the instructional space for career technical instruction

Through these projects, the District expects to increase campus security, improve the learning spaces for our students, and provide our students and community with updated gymnasiums.





Question: Shall the City of Willamina declare a temporary ban prohibiting Psilocybin-related businesses and manufacture of Psilocybin products within Willamina?

Summary: State law allows for the manufacturing, transportation, delivery, sale, and purchase of psilocybin, the psychedelic drug found in certain mushrooms. State law provides that a local government may adopt an ordinance to be referred to the voters to prohibit the establishment of licensed psilocybin product manufacturers and/or psilocybin service centers.

The Willamina City Council adopted an ordinance prohibiting the establishment of psilocybin product manufacturers and psilocybin service center operators within the City for a period of two years, which was referred to the voters per state law.

The two-year prohibition is intended to provide additional time for the City to enact reasonable time, place, and manner restrictions on licensed facilities.

Approval of this measure would prohibit the establishment of psilocybin product manufacturers and psilocybin service center operators within the City of Willamina until December 31, 2024.

Explanatory Statement Measure 36-217

Approval of this measure would establish a two-year prohibition on psilocybin product manufacturers and psilocybin service centers within the City of Willamina. Psilocybin is the psychedelic drug derived from certain mushrooms.

Oregon voters legalized psilocybin through Ballot Measure 109 in 2020, which directs the Oregon Health Authority (OHA) to develop a psilocybin licensing and regulatory program for the state by January 2, 2023. As a result, OHA intends to begin accepting applications for licenses for psilocybin product manufacturers and psilocybin service centers in January, 2023.

Ballot Measure 109 allows a local government to adopt an ordinance to be referred to the voters that prohibits the establishment of psilocybin-related businesses. The Willamina City Council has adopted such an ordinance to prohibit the establishment of psilocybin product manufacturers and psilocybin service centers within the City of Willamina until December 31, 2024.

Ballot Measure 109 also allows a local government to adopt reasonable time, place and manner restrictions on the operation of psilocybin facilities. Because these regulations typically result in amendments to the city's development code, the process to enact changes requires notice to the state as well as hearings before governing bodies. The temporary prohibition proposed by this Measure is intended to provide extra time to consider and enact such regulations before OHA issues licenses for psilocybin facilities in the City.

Bonds to construct job training space, improve classrooms, safety, technology

Question: Shall Portland Community College renovate and modernize facilities, estimated to maintain current tax rate by issuing \$450 million in bonds? If the bonds are approved, they will be payable from taxes on property or property ownership that are not subject to the limits of sections 11 and 11b, Article XI of the Oregon Constitution.

Summary: Measure authorizes up to \$450 million in principal amount of general obligation bonds for facilities and equipment. Measure not expected to increase tax rates above previous targets, because outstanding debt is scheduled to decline.

If approved, this measure would finance capital costs, including:

- Updated classrooms, technology, facilities, equipment to provide students with modern higher education and job training spaces, including flexible hybrid learning options.
- Improved accessibility for people with disabilities.
- Increased facility lifespan and efficiency through ventilation system upgrades, plumbing, electrical.
- Improved campus safety, lighting, transit stops.
- Expanded career technical education facilities in Washington County.
- Rebuilt/modernized Rock Creek, Sylvania facilities/classrooms.
- Site improvements, demolition, furnishing, equipping, acquiring land, bond issuance costs.

Regular audits to ensure funds are used as intended. Bonds may be issued in one or more series, with each series maturing in 16 years or less. Bond cost estimated to maintain fiscal year 2022 rate of 38 cents per \$1,000 of assessed value. Actual rates may differ and depend on interest rates incurred and assessed value growth.

Explanatory Statement Measure 26-224

Portland Community College (PCC) is the largest post-secondary institution in Oregon. Nearly 50,000 full and part-time students in Multnomah, Washington, Yamhill, Clackamas and Columbia counties attend Portland Community College to obtain career training and further their education.

This proposed bond measure would fund projects that make higher education more accessible and provide lifelong learning opportunities for all members of our community.

These investments would serve hundreds of thousands of Oregonians over the life of this bond, funding improvements to job training and learning spaces, modernizing technology, enhancing campus health, safety, and accessibility, updating classrooms to support hybrid learning—with some students learning in the classroom, while others participate remotely. It would save taxpayer dollars by making campuses more energy efficient and sustainable.

If approved, bond proceeds are expected to include the following capital investments:

- **Updated classrooms, technology, facilities, equipment to provide students with modern higher education and job training spaces**, including flexible hybrid-learning options—providing students with the flexibility and options to balance their education with other responsibilities.
- **Improve facilities and updated technology** to provide up-to-date job training spaces that can be adapted as businesses' needs evolve, so students graduate with the skills they need to compete in today's economy.
- **Improved accessibility** for people with disabilities.
- **Increased facility lifespan and efficiency** through heating and cooling upgrades and updated plumbing and electrical, to conserve operation expenses.
- **Addressing health and safety precautions**, including improved building ventilation and campus lighting, transit stops.
- **Renovating aging facilities** at Rock Creek and Sylvania. PCC would also expand technical career education in Washington County.
- Site improvements, demolition, furnishing, equipping, acquiring land, bond issuance costs.

The proposed bond projects would support students regardless of their zip code, background, or family circumstances, so that anyone who wants a college education would have access to one.

What would the bond cost?

Because of expiring bonds, the PCC bond measure is estimated to maintain current tax rates for local homeowners. If voters approve the bond it is expected to maintain the fiscal year 2022 rate of \$0.38 per \$1,000 of assessed value for 16 years. The taxpayer cost would be \$95 per year or \$7.92 per month for property with an assessed value of \$250,000. Assessed value is generally lower than market value.

The total principal amount of bonds authorized would not exceed \$450 million. Actual rates may differ and depend on interest rates incurred and assessed value growth.

Accountability

Funds from the bond would go directly to the projects that are expected to help achieve the goals outlined above. PCC would emphasize openness and transparency so that the public can track how funds from the bonds are spent, including a continuation of auditing to ensure funds are used as intended.

Original vs. Reissued/Replacement Ballots

Data is pulled 30 days prior:

The vast majority of our ballot packets are prepared from voter registration data 30 days before the election. That is done so that we have 10 days to prepare the packets before mailing them the 20th day before the election.

These ballot packets will have the word “**Original**” between the barcodes above your address.

Changes & Updates:

Voters move, change their name, change political party, spoil their ballot, etc. and that is normal and expected. However, when that happens after the “**Original**” ballot packet was created, a new ballot packet is created and provided to the voter.

These ballots will have the word “**Reissued**” or “**Replacement**” between the barcodes above your address.

“Original” Ballots:

When you see the word “**Original**” between the barcodes above your address, that means you are looking at the first ballot you were issued for that particular election.



“Reissued” or “Replacement” Ballots:

When you see the word “**Reissued**” or “**Replacement**” between the barcodes above your address, that means you are looking at the second or subsequent ballot you were issued for that particular election.



“Original” Ballots Inactivated:

Whether a voter receives a “**Reissued**” or “**Replacement**” ballot, their “**Original**” ballot packet is inactivated.

- Inactivated ballots will be rejected.
- Always vote the most recent ballot you have received


How to Cast Your Vote:

1 Complete your ballot

To vote, completely fill in the box next to your choice.

To vote for a person not on the ballot, fill in the box next to the “write-in” line, then neatly write the name of the person on the line provided.

You do not have to vote on all contests. Contests you do vote on will still count.



2 Check for errors

If you vote for more options than are allowed, your vote **will not count** for that contest.

If you think you made a mistake, call the Yamhill County Elections Office at (503) 434-7518 or (503) 554-7850 - Newberg.


If you would like to change your choice on a contest, draw a solid line through your original choice, then make your next selection.



3 Optional secrecy sleeve

If you use the optional secrecy sleeve, put only your voted ballot (not another person's ballot) inside. Then, put only your secrecy sleeve inside your return envelope.

(If we receive an envelope with more than one ballot inside, all enclosed ballots are rejected and not counted.)



4 Sign your ballot return envelope

You must sign your ballot return envelope, or your vote will not count. We verify every signature on every envelope against the voter files.



5 Return your ballot

- By mail - stamps are not required (*ballot return envelopes in Oregon use prepaid postage*)
- At any Official Ballot Drop Site (*see list on the back of this pamphlet*)
- At the County Clerk's Office

Frequently Asked Questions

What if I forgot to put my ballot in the secrecy sleeve and I have already sealed my white/purple envelope?

The optional secrecy sleeve is not required for your ballot to be counted. However, if you wish to use it, you may carefully open the envelope and tape it closed again or simply come to our office for a replacement envelope.

What if I did not receive a ballot? Call the Yamhill County Elections Office at (503) 434-7518 or (503) 554-7850 - Newberg.

I went to the DMV and got (or updated) my drivers' license but didn't receive a ballot. Why? What do I do? There are many reasons why the new "Oregon Motor Voter" process may not have been completed. Please call our office immediately for assistance.

What if I have moved and changed my residence or mailing address? You may update your voter registration in our office or at the website www.oregonvotes.gov. You will be issued the correct ballot for your new address.

If I choose not to vote for a candidate, contest or measure, will the rest of my ballot count? Yes.

Is it too late to update my voter registration? No. You have up until Election Day, November 8, 2022 to update your voter registration and receive a ballot if you are currently registered in Oregon.

When is the last day to mail my ballot and have it received by the Yamhill County Clerk's Office? The United States Postal Service recommends mailing 1 week before the Election (October 18, 2022) for your ballot to reach us on time. **Postmarks can count!**

When will results be available? The first results should be available just after 8:00 p.m. on Election Day, November 8, 2022. For election results you may visit our website at: <https://www.co.yamhill.or.us/elections> (*Be sure to "refresh" your browser each time you look for new results.*)
